Pumpkin **Investigations!**




Some second-grade students at Spruce Elementary "investigated" small pumpkins in the month of November. They were like true scientists, full of wonder and curiosity!

The Speech Tree NTMS Students Embrace D.E.A.R. **Initiative**

A new initiative took place at the beginning of this school year to try and encourage NTMS students to not only read, but find books they loved. D.E.A.R. stands for Drop Everything And Read. The first Wednesday of every month is dedicated to reading an extra twenty minutes during homeroom. Each student arrives in the morning with a book of their choice and is allowed to sit freely and read, with no academic expectations. Ariana Rose says, "It is an opportunity to read that we don't often get."

The students appreciate this bonus time and love that they start the morning in a relaxing setting and are reading for enjoyment. According to Molly Rosen, "A lot of people don't like to read on free will, but like the reminder to try and read. Many find that they enjoy it." Mason Crago, agrees stating, "I like to read a lot, but not everybody does and this helps them find books they love."

The students noted that the schedule change can be difficult to manage and wish it was publicized more so that the day didn't feel rushed, but they appreciate the chance to drop everything early in the morning and delve into a good book. This is just one of many reading initiatives at NTMS right now. Advisor Marissa Bloomfield says, "Our hope is to not only have students reading more, but instill a love of reading in our students that can lead to lifelong enjoyment."



Spruce Veterans Wall Holds Special Place in Aide's Heart



Teacher Aide Sally Urban spends time each November to help put up a Veterans Wall at Spruce Elementary to honor veterans who are near and dear to students and staff. One of the photos on the wall is her son Timothy Serwinowski who was a Marine and a 2007 North Tonawanda High School graduate. He did not return from his tour of duty in Afghanistan and she discusses her loss with the students as she talks about the sacrifices that the military and their families make to protect our country.

"I originally took on the Wall at the Middle School with Art teacher Christina Davis," she says. "When I came to Spruce they asked if it was something I was interested in doing here with Rose Mullins since Joanne LeVan retired from teaching." Students and staff are asked to bring in a photo of any relative who served our country and the photos are placed on the back wall when you first enter the school. There were about 76 photos hanging on the wall by Veteran's Day. "It is very heartwarming to see all the photos that people have brought in."

Sally and her daughter also try to find other ways to pay tribute to Tim and other military personnel. They have gathered donations and filled 300 boxes for care packages to send to troops overseas. They started the effort to put up hometown hero banners through North Tonawanda's streets with names and photos of local active-duty service men and women. The veterans' families and friends purchase the banners. "We have seen similar banners in Spencerport and Brockport and considering the amount of people in North Tonawanda who have sacrificed and served we felt that they should really be recognized," said Sally. Tim's banner, along with the other banners, is located at the Farmer's Market on the corner of Robinson Street and Payne Avenue.

Principal Patti Adler points to the Ganson Street Boys, where 41 residents went to war in a one city block. "On this tiny road, those 41 residents went to World War II and fought for our country. Few people know that. I think it is amazing what Sally has done to make sure everyone is recognized for their contribution."



"To get into All-County Band, students must prepare a solo from a specific list of solos set by the New York State School Music Association," explains Mr. Burgess. "Along with the solo, students must play scales from memory and play a sight-reading example (music they've never seen before) while they're in the room with a judge. The judge gives the students a score based on their performance, and the top scores of the day make it into the All-County Band. The students only had five weeks to prepare their solos this year, and they worked really hard to make it into the ensemble. These kids are just awesome!"

This year's band consists of 47 of the top 4th-6th grade musicians from Niagara County, and we are happy to send our five NTI musicians to perform with the All-County Band in early March!

Gifted and **Talented Program**

The new Gifted and Talented (GT) program, at North Tonawanda Intermediate, has begun and the students have been quite busy. They are having so much fun and are loving the challenge the GT program provides them.

Students in Mrs. Colletta's Math groups are competing in the Continental Mathematics League, which is a national math competition. They have been learning strategies for complex problem-solving and are working both individually and collaboratively to practice those strategies. They have already completed two of their five meets and they are doing wonderfully. Now they are working on developing board games which incorporate the math and problemsolving skills they have learned.



Mrs. Colletta's ELA (English Language Arts) groups just completed a writing unit. The students spent a good deal of time focused on creative writing. They learned about special techniques authors use to hook the reader and how to add detail and dialog to a story to bring characters to life. They studied foreshadowing and inferencing, and also did word studies to learn about new descriptive vocabulary.



Students practiced different divergent and convergent thinking strategies, as well as the four components of creative thinking (flexibility, fluency, originality, and elaboration). Then they used all their skills to complete a creative writing piece. They celebrated their hard work with a publishing party, where they were able to read the writing of other students and leave constructive feedback.

Reading Initiative **Celebrates Reading** at Middle School



The NTMS English Department, in conjunction with their reading specialists and the library media specialist, relaunched their reading celebration program in October.

The theme of this school year's celebration is "Color Your World with Books". Students completed independent reading tasks during special DEAR (Drop Everything and Read) day schedules, in ELA classes, as well as other team classes each week.

The October kick-off was filled with activities including scary-story themed "book tasting" in the library and a "Flash Fiction Friday" on the announcements, both hosted by Mrs. Edholm. Throughout the month, students who were caught reading were rewarded with a tasty treat from the staff. However, the highlight of October was the reading competition between the grade-level teams and Principal Mr. Janese. Needless to say, Mr. Janese lost as NTMS students read over 80,000 pages collectively. The overall winning team, Team Aries, read almost 28,000 pages! The prize was awarded when Team Aries student, Ava Woods, pushed a pie in Mr. Janese's face in front of Team Aries the day before winter recess.

The celebration closed out 2021 with the Gift of Reading event. Led by NTMS faculty members Amy Fiegl and Sara Bonitati, students were invited to take home a free, new or gently used book for themselves, family, or friends. The books donated by NTMS staff and the Teacher's Desk totaled well over 1,000 choices, and students were elated to accept the gift and to pay it forward to others.

As the new year starts, the reading will continue with a scavenger hunt, "shelfie" opportunities in the library, where students take a selfie with their favorite books, and the completion of the "Color Your World with Books" wall.

NTMS Girl Scouts Earn Silver **Award**

Congratulations to eighth graders Meredith Roberts, Meredith Shaver and Nora Davidson who recently earned their Girl Scouts' Silver Award.

The North Tonawanda Middle School students completed an amazing environmental project that benefited our city and its water supply. The students worked with the City Engineer to learn about the sewer system. They found it interesting that combined sewers collect water that is sent down the drains at houses and water from rainstorms and snow melting. These sewers are in the older part of the City and this water goes to the wastewater treatment plant on River Road. The other part of the City has separate sanitary and storm sewers. In these areas the sanitary sewers go to the treatment plant, but the storm sewers do not. Water that goes into the catch basins will go directly to the river or creeks. The City Engineer gave them a map of the City's sewers to help figure out where the separate storm sewers are located and where they should put the medallions. Storm medallions help remind people not to dump anything other than water down the catch basins because it will pollute our waterways. They were also given a tour of the wastewater treatment plant with the Water and Wastewater Superintendent to learn about where the combined sewers go and how the water is cleaned before it is sent back to the river.



The students met every Sunday morning at 7:00 a.m. for four hours from June to August to work on their project. They installed 200 storm water medallions at catch basins throughout the city this summer. Storm drain medallions are installed on the top of the curb behind a catch basin. To install them, first they used a wire brush to clean the concrete curb. Next, they used a caulk gun to squeeze adhesive on to the back of a medallion. Then the medallion was glued to the top of the curb where it had been cleaned. They also picked up garbage, leaves, and weeds from the top of the catch basins they visited. They learned how important it is to keep the catch basins clean so that rainwater will drain during a storm.

To keep track of where all the storm drain medallions are located, they used an app on their phones called JotForm where they could fill out the address, GPS location, and take a picture of the medallion. They gave copies of the medallion table and each form they made to the City Engineer.

In addition to the environmental and community benefits, this work is also considered public involvement. That means the City of North Tonawanda will be able to take credit in their annual storm water report that will be submitted to the NYSDEC in May.

On Tuesday, September 14, 2021, they presented their project at the North Tonawanda Common Council Meeting, and they were thanked for their community service. Only about 10 percent of Girl Scouts nationwide receive the Silver Award.



NTI Transforms into Art Gallery

Art teacher Melinda Wright highlighted her students' amazing work in the hallways, windows and display cases of the North Tonawanda Intermediate School.

Sixth graders had their cityscapes put on display. "The students researched and constructed watercolor cityscapes using foreground, middle ground and background compositional elements," Ms. Wright explains.

Insects were the theme for fifth graders who researched various creatures who have segmented bodies, jointed legs and exoskeletons. The students used several ceramic hand-building techniques to make their pieces.

"My fourth graders studied works by internationally renowned artist, illustrator and children's book author Hurvè Tullet," says Ms. Wright. "Tullet recently completed an exhibit at the Albright Knox Northland campus and installed a mural along Main Street in the Medical campus." For the display, Tullet's books were featured on the second floor near the library. "Our fourth grade artists made Tullet inspired "glass" windows with POSCA paint marker pens that are on display in our library."
