Ohio Mission Statement:

Parking - Parking - Parking

As many of you are aware, the parking situation at Ohio has been a complex issue for many years. Although we have improved parking conditions during the day - this year, as compared to last year, our parking issues during morning arrival and afternoon dismissal remain a great concern.

We have three current parking related issues that impact Ohio:

The first is our <u>Bus loading zones</u>: We have two bus loading/unloading zones at Ohio. Along *Ohio Street*, at the front of our school, we have a bus loading zone for our large school buses. Parents *can not* drop students off in the morning or pick them up in the afternoon in the assigned bus area on Ohio Street.


We have a second bus loading zone in the back parking lot that runs parallel to the primary wing of the school. Although there is a sign indicating that this area is for busses only, many parents often park in this area for drop-off/pick up reasons as well. Some parents have indicated that they wait until these busses have departed before entering this zone. There are two issues with this. The first is that if you are waiting in parking spots our employees do not have a place to park. The second is, some of our busses arrive at a later time particularly during inclement weather. Although many busses may have arrived and departed, we still need to maintain a safe area for the boarding of a late arriving bus. The red cones indicate that cars can not park in this area and that the school is expecting an additional bus (es).

The third parking conflict reflects parents' efforts to park along the *perimeter of Ohio School*, in front of the houses which neighbor our school. Although these areas have clearly posted No Parking signs, many parents often park there during the arrival and dismissal times. Although our focus and concern with this current issue is directed at the bussing zones, I do note that the streets that surround Ohio have been consistently posted as No Parking zones.

While I recognize the frustration of parents as you look for close parking to the school, I am also aware that throughout the year many of our Ohio neighbors - the residents, who live in the houses immediately surrounding the school, remain dissatisfied that the "No Parking" signs are not more fully enforced.

The North Tonawanda City School District Offices and architects have developed, as part of the Capital Improvement Project, an improvement plan which contains modifications and additions to the parking and bussing conditions for our school. This is inclusive of, but not limited to, the addition of a bussing circle - for busses only. These improvements will be occurring during the summer of 2011.

At this time, I would recommend that parents who are electing to drive to drop off or pickup their children park along the adjacent streets, which are not posted to prohibit parking. Parents can then safely walk to greet their children at the school and escort them back to their cars. We have also asked the grounds crew to create an area on the corner of Ohio Street and Abington Place which is free of snow banks for dropping off children who are old enough to walk to the building unescorted. This area is not intended for the parking of vehicles.

Reminder: Telephone and Cell Phone Use

Telephone use, by the student, during the school day is discouraged. Students should work with their parents to plan ahead to include homework, field trip permission slips, physical education and musical education equipment, within their preparation for each school day in order to build responsibility and organization skills.



Additionally, while students within our schools may possess mobile and digital technology, including but not limited to personal or family cell phones, possession of these items are subject to the following rules:

- 1. No use of mobile or digital devices is permitted on school grounds. These devices should not be seen nor heard during the school day.
- 2. Students possessing these devices may NOT turn these devices on while on school grounds until the end of the official instructional day, unless during an emergency situation AND with adult permission to do so.
- 3. The school and/or school district is NOT responsible for lost, stolen, or damaged equipment.
- 4. Should a cell phone or other device be seen or heard during the school day, these possessions may, in part or in whole, be removed by the teacher or adult in charge and held until parent pick-up can be arranged.

From the Nurse...

An important reminder: Both district policy and New York State regulations require that ANY medication, prescription as well as over the counter medications, MUST have a doctors note for the school nurse to administer to the student. This includes cough drops, inhalers, ointments, and pain relievers.

Please have your child's emergency contacts up to date and try to choose contacts that are available to pick up student when they are ill. It is uncomfortable for a child to be in the Health Office for hours when they are not feeling well.

Additionally, when your child has attended a doctor, dentist or counseling appointment and has come to school late, please remember to request a note from your health care provider.

Let's Keep Safety On Our Minds....

We all know that following afternoon dismissal, we are excited and distracted. Students want to get home and parents have things to do! We are all busy and to get to the next place we need to be. We would ask, however, that you safety on the top of your "To Do" list. With added mounds of snow and winter clothing, many of our students are more distracted than usual. Our Crossing Guards are charged with the most precious responsibility – keeping our students safe. As you are picking up your children or traveling by our schools, certain to take the time to:

Honor the responsibilities of the crossing guards – and follow his/her directions

- Please remind your children to travel directly home discourage them from stopping to play in the snow or snow hills – as this only adds to potential safety concerns

If you are picking up your children, please be certain that you keep the students off of the snow mounds – especially around the parking lot! Safety is our first priority and we sometimes need to be certain that **we** are thinking ahead – especially when our children want to "run ahead."



***Please also remember that at all times during the year, our students should be wearing shoes or sneakers that are <u>safe and secure on their feet</u>. Flip-flops or sandals worn to school increase the possibility of slipping and injury!

Thank you for working together with us to keep our children safe!

The Art room has been filled with creative minds and energetic students. In case you haven't seen the artwork in the hallways....you are really missing something. You can tell the effort the students are portraying is above and beyond!

Yes, kindergarteners are artists too. The kindergarteners have developed a sketchbook and have shared there talents in their *Lion and Monkey drawings*.

They may even be talking about "Wassily Kandinsky." The first graders have developed animal drawings as Artist Edward Hicks developed "The Peaceable Kingdom."

The experience of developing a *paper quilt* has brought the second graders together as a community. Each group had a task to achieve in order for the quilt to go together properly. You know what? They did it! The quilt will be on display in a few weeks. Meanwhile, the art of *Mosaic Design* have been explored by third graders as fourth grade completed *Stained Glass* projects. Both grade levels are moving on to *watercolor* techniques.

The art of advertising is the new adventure of the 5th graders. Learning about advertisements and the "Z syntax" method of design brought each project to life. Talking about "Surrealism" is the next advertising method we are exploring. They may be watching the commercials more careful at night to notice the surrealism. By the way...Surrealism is half real/half fantasy. There is more and more of it in the world of today.

Sixth graders have been painting "Monochromatic

Landscapes." They make winter look calm and beautiful. The watercolor paintings like Henri Matisse created gave each 6th grader to be a "Fauve", wild beast, paint red trees with purple leaves. I even had fun with that project.

The frames are all filled with new art work. The framed artwork will hang in the teachers conference room, teachers lunch room and student lunch room. Due to the renovation this summer the art work will be returned to each artist by June.

SEX OFFENDER NOTIFICATION

The North Tonawanda Police Department has informed the school district that we will no longer be receiving written notification of level 2 and 3 sex offenders through the mail as we have in the past. The Niagara County Sheriff's Department created a web site listing all the level 2 and 3 sex offenders in their jurisdiction and the NT Police Department has teamed up with them. Level 2 and 3 sex offenders residing in North Tonawanda are now on that web site.

Additionally, the web site will allow users to sign up for a notification service that will automatically notify you via e-mail every time a level 2 or 3 sex offender moves into or from place to place within Niagara County.

The Niagara County Sheriff's Department web site is www.ncsd.com/SOR/. Please also remember that the New York State web site is www.criminaljustice.state.ny.us/sor/. The state web site allows you to search by name, county, or zip code throughout New York. The state's toll free number is 1-800-262-3257.
